STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

P-12 EDUCATION

Your P-12 Education Committee held its scheduled meeting on October 9, 2012. All members were present except for Chancellor Emeritus Bennett and Regent Rosa, who were excused.

ACTION ITEMS

Safety Net for Students with Disabilities

Your C ommittee r ecommends that section 100.5 o f the R egulations of t he Commissioner of Education be amended, as submitted, effective October 31, 2012, as an e mergency act ion upo n a finding by t he B oard of R egents t hat s uch action is necessary f or the preservation of the general welfare in order to ensure the timely implementation during the 2012-2013 school year of the safety net options for students with disabilities to graduate with a local diploma. [P-12 (A) 1]

MOTION FOR ACTION BY FULL BOARD

Madam Chancellor and Colleagues: Your P-12 Education Committee recommends, and we move, that the Board of Regents act affirmatively upon each recommendation in the written report of the Committee's deliberations at its meeting on October 10, 2012, copies of which have been distributed to each Regent.

MATTERS NOT REQUIRING BOARD ACTION

<u>Special Education Regulations</u> – The Committee discussed proposed amendments to regulations to conform Commissioner's Regulations to Chapters 267 and 279 of the Laws of 2012 relating to CSE membership and IEP dissemination requirements. If endorsed by the Regents, the proposed amendments will come back to the Regents for action in December. [P-12 (D) 1]

<u>Charter S chool O ffice U pdate</u> – The C ommittee was provided an upd ate on the activities of the Department's Charter School Office in carrying out the Board of Regents public charter school aut horization and oversight responsibility. The C ommittee discussed the Performance F ramework (to be presented to the Board of Regents in November) that covers all areas of school and system accountability. Also discussed was the federal Charter Schools Program Grant used to support the opening of quality charter schools. Staff reported that 27 new charter schools opened this school year and 19 more are slated to open in the fall of 2013. [P-12 (D) 2]

CTE Advisory Panel Update – The Committee was provided an update on the activities of the CTE Advisory Panel, which met for the first time on September 18, 2012. The Panel was charged with developing recommendations to strengthen CTE K-12 learning and to address gaps in the CTE learning continuum statewide. Initial recommendations focused on four critical areas: st udents, t eachers, sch ool I eaders, and community economic development. The Panel will re-convene on October 15, 2012 and focus on the recommendations around these four critical areas. [P-12 (D) 3]

<u>Proposed R egents S tate L egislative P riorities</u> – The Committee di scussed proposed legislative p riorities for the cr eation of R egional S econdary S chools; S upport a nd Intervention in C hronically U nderperforming S chools; M andate R elief a nd F lexibility; BOCES as Regional Leaders and the Race to the Top Longitudinal Data System. Final legislative pr iorities will be pr esented to the B oard of R egents for approval at their November or December meeting. [P-12 (D) 4]

<u>Updates on Early Learning Initiatives</u> – The Committee discussed the QualitystarsNY program; a voluntary quality rating and i mprovement system designed to ensure that New York's pre-kindergarten-age children have the opportunity to experience high quality early I earning experiences. Other discussion focused on the D epartment's proposed legislative priority to request additional UPK funding, provide funding flexibility to support full-day UPK programs and allow Transportation Aid to be used for UPK transportation. The Committee agreed to move forward with the legislative priority and also re-affirmed its commitment to the transition to universal full-day kindergarten. [P-12 (D) 5]

<u>Diagnostic Tool for School and District Effectiveness</u> – The Committee discussed the Diagnostic Tool for School and District Effectiveness, a key component of New York's Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) waiver. Discussion focused on the six tenets of school and district effectiveness and the five pilot reviews conducted in Albany and Rochester this past spring. During the pilot reviews, schools were engaged in the protocols of the review process and debriefing sessions were held with the staff and district ad ministrators. As a result, there have be en numerous requests from districts for professional development and mentoring on the six tenets of the rubric. The six tenets are: district I eadership and capacity; school I eadership practice and decisions; cu rriculum dev elopment and support; t eacher practices and decisions;

student so cial an dem otional dev elopmental he alth; and family and community engagement. [P-12 (D) 6]

<u>Updates from the Office of Accountability and the Office of School Innovation</u> – The Committee discussed the wide range of funding opportunities available to districts with low-performing schools, including School Improvement Grant funds (SIG); the School Innovation F und Grant; and C ommissioner's Schools Dissemination and R eplication Grants. The Committee also discussed the Systemic Supports for District and School Turnaround Grant, which assists districts in building their capacity to reframe systems and structures to both support and hold schools accountable. Of the eighteen eligible districts for this grant, se venteen su bmitted complete a pplications on or be fore the deadline of August 1, 2012. The Department approved applications from eight districts. [P-12 (D) 7]

AUDITS/BUDGET AND FINANCE

The Regents Committee on Audits/Budget and Finance met as scheduled this morning, October 10, 2012. Regents Bendit, Brown, Cashin, Cea, Jackson, Phillips, Tallon, Tilles, and Young were in attendance.

Co-Chair's Remarks: Regent Chapey welcomed everyone and stated that economic challenges call us all to innovate and work as partners in developing new approaches to education reform.

Items for Discussion

Proposed Audit Initiatives for the Office of Audit Services

The Committee was presented with a summary of the proposed audit initiatives to be undertaken by the Office of Audit Services in the next year (November 2012 to October 2013). The plan is to continue audits of school districts with new emphasis on Race to the Top funds, and School Improvement Grant funding. The plan also calls for new initiatives in the areas of compliance with Annual Professional Performance Reviews and Test Security.

The plan also calls for the audit of special education providers in order to enhance the Comptroller's efforts and dev elop t he expertise w ithin S ED. The r emaining t wo initiatives will cover audits of non-profit recipients of Federal Funds and some Follow-up audits of those issued in the past several years.

Completed Audits

The Committee was presented with 5 audits this month. All of the audits were issued by the Office of the State Comptroller (OSC). The audits were of one charter school, three school districts and one BOCES.

The findings were in the areas of procurement, claims processing, information technology, and capital construction.

September 2012 Fiscal Report

Our Executive Deputy Commissioner briefed the Committee members.

Overall spending in the General Fund reflects a 2.5 percent reduction from the 2011-2012 I evels as included in the 2 012-2013 enacted budget. The report reflects the beginning of the impact of new I egislation that will enhance our proprietary school oversight. General Fund accounts are instructural balance with the exception of the Tenured Teacher Hearings (TTH). The report format related to the teacher tenure hearing account was changed to reflect the deficit coming from the prior year.

Special Education Fiscal Oversight - Update

Department staff continues to work on putting forth specific recommendations related to reforming the oversight of special education providers. It is expected that some of the recommendations will be presented to the Regents in November.

PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

Your Professional Practice Committee held its scheduled meeting on October 9, 2012. All Committee members were present. Chancellor Merryl H. Tisch and Regent James C Dawson were also present, but did not vote on any case or action.

ACTION ITEMS

Professional Discipline Cases

Your C ommittee r ecommends that the r eports of the R egents Review C ommittees, including rulings, findings of fact, determinations as to guilt, and recommendations, by unanimous or majority vote, contained in those reports which have been distributed to you, be a ccepted in 8 cases. In addition, your C ommittee r ecommends, upon the recommendation of the Committee on the Professions, that 20 consent order applications and 3 surrender applications be granted.

In the case of Keyna T. Jackson, Licensed Practical Nurse, Calendar No. 26123, we recommend that the caption, heading, and body in the report of the Regents Review Committee as well as the caption and heading in the terms of probation and on the blue back to the report all be deemed corrected and be deemed to read respondent's correct name "Keyna T. Jackson," and not "Kenya T. Jackson."

These r ecommendations are m ade following t he r eview of 31 ca ses involving t en licensed practical n urses, four r egistered professional n urses, t hree d entists, three licensed practical nurses who are also registered professional nurses, two professional engineers, one acupuncturist, one chiropractor, one massage therapist, one pharmacist, one pharmacy, and one podiatrist.

Restorations

Your Committee recommends the following:

That the application of Karl E aston for the restoration of his license to practice as a physician in New York State be denied. [PPC EXS (A) 4]

That the application of Arvinder Singh for the restoration of his license to practice as a physician in New York State be granted to the extent that the revocation of his license be stayed, that he be placed on probation for a period of three years in accordance with the Terms of Probation, and that, upon satisfactory completion of the probationary term, his license be fully restored. [PPC EXS (A) 5]

That the application of Mahmood Yoonessi for the restoration of his license to practice as a physician in New York State be denied in accordance with the draft Determination of the Board of Regents. [PPC EXS (A) 6]

In addition the Committees discussed the program registration requirements and approval process for online learning.

Statewide P lan f or Higher E ducation. Your Committee reached consensus on the final d raft of the 2012–2020 S tatewide P lan f or Higher E ducation and recommended that the Department proceed with the public hearings on the completed draft plan.

APPR/RTTT. Your Committee heard an update on the APPR process and approvals.

Legislative P riorities. Y our C ommittee di scussed the following proposed R egents priority legislation.

Early C ollege H igh S chool (ECHS) pr ograms (S.5647 – Flanagan/A.9312 – Nolan): The Regents have proposed using portions of Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) funds to s ustain E CHS pr ograms. ECHS are innovative partnerships that increase high school graduation and postsecondary degree completion rates among underrepresented students.

Education Equity for DREAMers (S.6621 – Rules/A.9344 Glick): In New York, thousands of undocumented students receive an education through the state's P-12 public school system but are unable to access higher education opportunities. The Regents have proposed legislation to give these undocumented students the opportunity to attend college by making them eligible for state financial aid.

HIGHER EDUCATION/CULTURAL EDUCATION JOINT MEETING

Your Higher Education Committee and Cultural Education Committee held a joint meeting on October 10, 2012.

Early C hildhood/Elementary C ert a nd Arts. Your H igher E ducation and C ultural Education Committees met jointly to discuss the current requirements for K-6 teachers with regard to art credit, and what other states currently require.

CULTURAL EDUCATION

Regent Roger Tilles, Chair of the Cultural Education Committee, submitted the following written report. Your Committee on Cultural Education Committee had its scheduled meeting on October 10, 2012.

NYS Summer School of the Arts 2012 session wrap up

Deputy C ommissioner C annell i ntroduced S ara Fittizzi, E xecutive D irector of the Summer School of the Arts. Fittizzi provided a brief historyof the program emphasizing the opportunities and inspirations of the program, regardless of income, to talented school-age students. Selections are made through an audition process. Ms. Fittizzi recommended members review the materials that were provided to all members of the Board which contains CDs of performances as well as letters from artistic faculty.

While the program is its 43rd year, it is its second year operated under the umbrella of the O ffice of C ultural E ducation. The program currently operates seven schools of various artistic disciplines including ballet, choral studies, dance, media arts, orchestral studies, theatre and visual arts with over 400 students participating.
